James presents Graffiti Bill to **Parliament**

JAMES has presented proposals to Parliament which, if they become law, would require people who commit the criminal damage act of graffiti to clean it up and meet the victim whose property they vandalised.

Under the guidelines, once an offender is caught, they would be issued with a 'clean-up' order, requiring them to go back to the site, or a similar site, and clean up the mess they made.

James has been working with a local advisory panel in Rochford & Southend East to get the proposals right, and to hear views about how they would work in practice. The panel is made up of Councillors, the Police, youth workers and others who work regularly on

tackling graffiti in Southend. James would especially like to thank Cllr Ian Robertson and Karon Grant from Southend Borough Council, and Chief Inspector Steve Worron for their

Southend-on-Sea Borough Council spent £150,000 last year cleaning up graffiti. Talking about the problem James said, "Graffiti is an eye-sore and blight for many parts of our town. There's no getting away from the fact that

it's criminal damage, and a longterm reminder of anti-social behaviour that adversely affects everyone.

'Many local councils such as Southend Council do an excellent job with the resources they have; cleaning off as much graffiti as they can as quickly as possible. But graffiti shouldn't be appearing in the first place - we need offenders to realise the impact their behaviour has on the community so that they stop creating graffiti altogether.

James hopes the proposals in his Criminal Damage (Graffiti) Bill will act as a deterrent, "I believe that by making offenders clean up their mess, they will realise the true cost of what they have done.

'I've been out in Southend with one of the Council's clean-up vans myself, and can testify that it's a hard job getting paint off walls certainly hard enough to put people off risking getting caught again."

James has been working closely with ENCAMS, the environmental campaigns charity that is also behind Keep Britain Tidy and the Blue Flags scheme, which recognises the high quality of Southend's beaches.

In Parliament, James' proposals have cross-party support, and MPs from a range of political parties have also signed up to an Early Day Motion that echoes the sentiments of James' Bill.

JAMES recently spent an afternoon with the local lifeboat team for a hands-on demonstration of the work they do.

Not one to shy away from a challenge, James donned all the gear; a full waterproof drysuit, lifejacket and helmet and went out on call with the crew.

The first thing James had to say about the day was that the commitment and professionalism of the volunteers is outstanding. In their day-jobs, their careers are



wide-ranging; with firemen, policemen and builders all on the team - as well as a man in marine insurance, which seemed somewhat apt. All of them volunteer their time to be on call in the event of an emergency, as well as going out on regular exercises to keep up with their training.

Earlier on, James' visit was nearly cancelled as the lifeboat was out searching for a potential body, after some clothes had been found on the beach.

The team feared the worst, but it turned out that the clothes had been there for some time, and thankfully it had indeed been a

Working on a lifeboat certainly isn't a job for the faint-hearted. The boats are pretty speedy - going up to 40 miles an hour when necessary - and they of course operate in all weather conditions. It's reassuring for all of us living so close to the sea that there's a strong and reliable lifeboat team on hand to keep us safe.

JAMES has been out 'calling the balls' at the local bingo hall, and learning about issues surrounding the popular pastime.

Visiting the Mecca Bingo Hall in Greyhound Way, James was treated to a tour of the main hall, which can hold up to 1,000 players at a time, by representatives of Mecca Bingo and their owners, Rank Group. James even took to the stage himself to call out the first line of numbers for the 700-strong crowd playing the afternoon sitting.

James said, "Visiting Mecca Bingo was great fun, and I was honoured to be asked to call out the balls. I think I got most of the numbers right, but I won't be giving up my day job!"

The visit was intended as an opportunity to find out more about the bingo hall, which has over 100,000 members, and the pastime more generally. In particular, thanks to a postcard campaign by local people, James was already aware of the issue of 'double taxation' that the bingo industry is facing, whereby bingo is taxed for both Value Added Tax (VAT) and Gross Profit Tax.

James commented, "The huge social value of the bingo hall in Greyhound Way was obvious to me as soon as I walked in the door. It plays a large part in the lives of thousands of local people, both as a place for a leisure activity and as somewhere to come and socialise. The lessons I've learned today will stay with me for a long time to come."




